








Kings County Medical Society


In 1806 the New York State Legislature passed "An Act to Incorporate Medical **Societies for the Purpose** of Regulating Physic and Surgery in the State". The first license granted by **Kings County Medical** Society was to Dr. John Carpenter in 1822. The first physician proposed for membership in 1823 was Dr. Nelson L. Hurd, a graduate of Yale Medical College

Alexander Johnson Chalmers Skene, MD, President MSCK 1874 and 1875







Dr. Alexander J. C. Skene 1837-1900





Born in Scotland, he graduated from LICH (Downstate) in 1863. He is remembered for his description of Skene's glands but he also performed the first successful gastroelytrotomy and craniotomy using Sim's speculum. He published over 100 articles and several textbooks



John Byrne, M.D., M.R.C.S.E., L.L.D. 1825-1902



Dr. Byrne was a founder of Saint Mary's Hospital (closed 2005) and Co-Founder of LICH in 1857 (closed 2014). He was the first president of the Brooklyn Gynecological Society and was Vice-President of MSCK. He, as well as his other Brooklyn contemporaries like Skene, collaborated and revered J. Marion Sims.

James Marion Sims 1813-1883



Known as the "father of gynecology", he invented the Sims' speculum, the Sims's sigmoid catheter and the Sims' position. He established, in New York, the first women's hospital








The first stated meeting held in the new building at the McNaughton Auditorium on January 16, 1900


The geographical center of Brooklyn, the cornerstone was laid in on 11/10/1898 and was opened to the membership on 5/19/1900. It cost \$87,000 (2.6M) todays dollars): \$17,500 for land, \$50,000 for construction of the building and \$20,000 for furnishings.

Abraham Jacobi, M.D., L.L.D., 1830-1919.






Dr. Jacob earned his MD from the University of Bonn in 1851. He was conferred LLD by Columbia University. A pioneer in the diseases of children, he was president of the NY State Medical Society in 1882, president of the NY Academy of Medicine 1885-1888 and president of the NY County Medical Society 1870-1872




William Browning MD, President 1901

He was Directing Librarian from 1891-1901 and again from 1917-1927




The medical library of Kings **County Medical Society was** formed in 1844. In 1905, to avoid competition, the Society's Brooklyn Medical Journal was allowed to go out of existence in deference to the Long Island **Medical Journal** the State Society's New York State Journal of Medicine . By the early 20th century Kings County Medical **Society had the 5th largest** medical library in the country, including a rare book section.


Merging of the Medical Libraries of the Academy of Medicine of Brooklyn and the Downstate Medical Center in 1962




Merging of the Medical Libraries of the Academy of Medicine of Brooklyn and the **Downstate Medical** Center occurred in 1962 during the term of Dr. Leslie H. Tisdall. Dr. Robert A. Moore was Past President of MSCK and Dean of the Downstate Medical Center. The Society's library became part of the Medical Research Library of Brooklyn under the control of a Joint Commission.




MSCK and Downstate Merged Libraries' Charter



The **Medical** Library **Association** of Brooklyn was chartered by the University of the State of New York in 1961.


The Associated Physicians of Long Island





A Brooklyn Idea



Frank D. Jennings, M.D, President **1922.** To mark the 100th anniversary of the County Society, President Frank D. Jennings appointed a Clinical Committee to develop his "idea" of continuous medical education for every practitioner in the county as a demonstration of public service, and as a contribution of the Society in the cause of public health. A resolution was offered and passed approving the concept that one of the Society's' functions was graduate teaching.


Vernal G. Cave, MD

First Black President MSCK,1981

Dr. Cave was born in Panama while his father, from Barbados, was working on the Panama Canal. He was President of the National Medical Association (NMA) in 1974 and president of Provident Clinical Society, the Brooklyn chapter of NMA from 1963-69. Dr. Cave practiced dermatology on President Street in Crown Heights and was Director of the Bureau of Venereal Disease Control of NYC Dept. of Health

Duncan W. Clark MD

1910-8/5/2007




Dr. Clark was the 135th president from 1984-1985 and president of the New York Academy of Medicine from 1983-1984. He advocated for the addition of fluoride to the New York City water supply. He earned his medical degree at Long Island College Hospital Medical School in 1936. Clark served as Dean of the Long Island College of Medicine. The **Duncan Clark Library Fund was** established at the Academy of the Medical Society of the County of King. The Duncan Clark Awards and Lectureships honor him today



The Medical Society of the County of Kings celebrates 200 years of physician representation and community service in Brooklyn

In 1872, a dinner celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Society went into arrears to the sum of \$30, due although they attended the affair. Fortunately, the treasury showed a balance of \$753.67. Dues were \$5 per year bers: Mrs. F. D. La Vergne, an 1855 graduate of the Hydro-31

ney, who was born in Brooklyn and who was graduated from the N.Y. Medical College for Women in 1870. Dr. McKenney was the first Negro female physician in the United States. Also an active member about this time was Dr. August Jacobi, a graduate of the University of Göttingen, circa 1860. Dr. Jacobi was one of the earliest borough physicians of Jewish descent.

In 1890, the Brooklyn Gynecological Society was founded, many of its founders being leaders in the Medical Society.

On May 14, 1896, the Jenner Centennial commemorating the inauguration of smallpox vaccine was celebrated the guests received large bronze medals struck especially the Society:
